Started in the Fall of 2022, Little Paws is Williams Bay School District's play-based, 4K preparation program. The curriculum is theme driven where focus is put on developing fine and gross motor skills along with sensory integration. At Little Paws, we are working to promote independence, self-awareness, cooperation, and language development.

Little Paw students start their day with a table activity and reading books. We call this a "soft start" that focuses on the students making their own choices. Then we move into a morning greeting and a song followed by structured time where we learn about the calendar, colors, shapes, body parts, feelings, weather, and the letter of the week depending on our theme. From there we read a book out loud together and then do a craft that correlates with the story.

The bulk of our day is play! We have several different centers: dramatic play, block center, puzzle center, sensory play, library, and art. Here students pick and choose where they play and for how long. During center play they work on skills like sharing, communication, and problem-solving. After center play, we have a whole group movement break, snack, and end our day with time outdoors. We pack a lot of fun, hands-on, engaging activities in a short time!

For the 2023-2024, school year we are offering full day and half day options. All children who are 3 years old (prior to September 1) are welcome to join Little Paws! Please call 262-245-5571 to schedule a visit to come see our classroom. Our door is always open!

Coding at the Elementary School

Students at Williams Bay Elementary explored computer coding throughout the month of December in Library-Tech Class using Hour of Code. The Hour of Code began as a one-hour coding challenge to give students a fun first introduction to computer science and has become a global learning event. See http://hourofcode.com/us for details. While coding, students learn important life skills like creativity, problem solving, teamwork, communication, critical thinking, and most importantly, perseverance.

"When I first started using Hour of Code with students, any time they got stuck, their hand would go in the air. I spent most of the class helping students. What I noticed this year was that students were helping each other and they seemed more focused and willing to do things wrong to figure out the solution," said Amy Mitchell, 4K-5 Library Tech Teacher.

Gail Bixler, Technology Coordinator, has been working with grade levels doing different coding activities. These include the kindergarten students using tiles to code a small robot called Cubetto. Second grade students place tiles in front of an iPad to code Awbie onscreen collecting points to build a virtual environment for him. Fourth and fifth grade students are using block coding to have two robots, Dot and Dash perform a variety of tasks. These activities along with the computer coding activities help our students become better thinkers, risk-takers, and team players.

Technology is all around us, and we know that whatever field our children choose to go into as adults, their ability to succeed will increasingly depend on understanding how technology works.

Fiscal Update By: Jennifer Frederick, Business Manager

A strong partnership between the School District and its community members is based on open communication and transparency. It is in this spirit, that I wanted to provide an update on the district's fiscal status.

As spoke about in previous articles, the Williams Bay School District (and most districts around the state) are facing a fiscal cliff beginning in 2024. While we continue to anxiously wait for the state biennial budget to be finalized, our current projections show a definite need for additional funding from our local tax base. As explained previously, the state funding formula is flawed and state legislators have confirmed their intent for local taxpayers to be responsible for deciding on the adequate funding level of local schools, rather than the state.

Currently, COVID funding, called ESSER funds, will help us finish the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years without a budget shortfall. When the funding for the ESSER program runs out and the program ends, the School District will be faced with approximately a \$1.5M shortfall for the 2024-2025 school year. This short fall will directly impact our students, which we can all agree, are our number one priority. We hope this shortfall improves with the state budget and other factors, but the need for a referendum is indisputable.

Earlier this year, the School Board for the Williams Bay School District decided to wait until Spring of 2024 to potentially put the referendum on the ballot. This gives us just over a year to firm up state biennial budget numbers, minimize and manage costs wherever possible internally, and present to the taxpayers a true need and not estimate for the funding needed. District leadership will continue to communicate with our community partners about our tax savings measures and revenue projections. At this time, we anticipate the 2023 mill rate to drop over \$1.00 (per \$1,000 property value) and a \$700,000 drop in District debt interest costs. For now, please know the Williams Bay School District is continuing to use your funds wisely to help reduce debt costs, maximize state/federal funding programs and grants, as well as fine tune our operational structure to minimize our referendum request.

The Wisconsin Forward Exam

The Wisconsin Forward Exam is designed to gauge how all students are doing in relation to the Wisconsin Academic Standards. These standards outline what

students should know and be able to do in order to be college-career ready. The Forward Exam is administered online in the spring of each school year at: grades 3-8 in English language arts (ELA) and mathematics; Grades 4 and 8 in science; and Grades 4, 8, and 10 in social studies.

Williams Bay Elementary School students in grades 3-5 will participate in these assessments between March 20-24. We have been working with students to prepare for these assessments using testtaking strategies for content areas as well as strategies to help manage stress and anxiety that some students feel during testing. Teachers have also been working with students using test preparation booklets to help students become familiar with the types of vocabulary and questions they will experience when taking these assessments.

We take all assessments very seriously. Results provide information about student performance, allowing teachers to target instruction to student needs. Assessment results also enable teachers to reflect upon their own instructional practices. Students, administrators, and parents also gain valuable information that provides a better understanding of what students know and what we can do to support and assist them.

Sample or practice test questions can be found at <u>Forward Exam Practice Test and Sample Items</u> | <u>Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction.</u> There is also an online tools training that will be available for students and is intended to give students the opportunity to practice with the tools available on the Forward Exam. Investing In Our Students' Futures - Industry 4.0



Williams Bay High School Tech-Ed students recently finished their first Industry 4.0 course offering in Industrial Robotics this past semester. Upon completion of the course, several students will be earning a certification through the Smart Automation Certification Alliance (SACA).

Industry 4.0 – also called the Fourth Industrial Revolution is the next phase in the development of the manufacturing sector. The Williams Bay School District's Technology Education Department, led by Mr. Jacob White, recently became a member of the Smart Automation Certification Alliance (SACA). SACA is a non-profit foundation whose mission is to develop & deploy highly accessible industry driven certifications that increase a student's knowledge and skillsets in Smart Factory/Industry 4.0 environments. This helps to ensure that companies have the highly skilled workers that they need and helps students get a jump in the Industry 4.0 world.

In additional to the initial course offering, Mr. White is developing

additional courses including Introduction to Industrial Controls and Introduction to Mechatronics, courses that will align with two additional SACA certifications. Preparations have already been underway for developing these courses with careful consideration for equipment, space, and curriculum needs in time for the 2024-2025 school year.

Using the State's DWD Fast Forward Grant and new industry partners like MPM and Brunk Industries, Williams Bay School will be provided immeasurable opportunities for students interested in a future in automation. SACA certifications add direct value to a student's employment marketability and will be a significant attribute to anyone's resume regardless of the student entering the automation industry or not.

Since 2011, the History Club has renovated this once forgotten park into a thing of beauty. Students fundraise through the year to be able to purchase plants and flowers for the park. They water, weed and plant all summer long.

This year, a new Community Service project is scheduled. "National Clean a Historical Monument Day" in April will find History Club Volunteers cleaning the many historical markers in Williams Bay.

Working with the Forest County Potawatomi People, the History Club is near completion of a 3-year research project of the Ancient Native Burial Ground in Williams Bay to hopefully provide information so one day, the burial ground will be recognized as an Indigenous People Historical Landmark.
